

Covid? It's not just us!!

I was recently sent this communication which I pass on with the author's permission. The disease documented below has been prevalent for the last few years and is one of a number of diseases affecting both our flora and fauna. However, this one can be tackled as detailed below.

Hello there,

I would like to bring to your attention an illness that was noticed by residents of Wetherup Street in September/October last year among the greenfinch population. During June and July we had a fairly large number of greenfinches visiting our garden and using the bird feeders along with the other birds as usual. However in September I noticed one greenfinch with fluffed up plumage around the neck and with saliva collected around it's beak perching on the feeder tray. As it rest-



ed on the tray it allowed me to approach, very unusually, within a couple of feet before it flew off into a nearby hedge. A few days later I found a greenfinch dead in the feeder tray. This was the first of several dead greenfinches displaying the same symptoms that I found in and around the garden. Other residents of Wetherup Street have also noted dead greenfinches as well as a resident of Page's Green during September and October. Since then I have only seen one greenfinch this winter and I suspect that the population has been reduced, if not decimated by this illness.

I have checked the British Trust for Ornithology website and the symptoms indicate that the disease is trichomonosis, which is a parasite affecting the back of the throat and the gullet of the bird. It also affects chaffinches and although I have not seen any dead chaffinches We have only seen two in the garden this winter which is an unusually small number. Trichomonosis also affects pigeons, doves and birds of prey. The disease is not a threat to humans or pets.

Transmission of the disease is thought to be through contaminated water and feed. Cleaning and disinfecting of feeders and of bird baths is recommended in order to stop the spread of the disease. The BTO also recommend to stop putting bird feed out in order to stop birds congregating in large numbers in one place. I did stop feeding the birds for three weeks during the autumn. when I did start feeding again there were no greenfinches.

# Snippets from the Village History:

(The village shop in Brockford)

Shopkeeping written by Edna Thurston

In 1846 John Thurston owned a piece of nursery land in Stowupland. This was needed to make way for the railway to Norwich and for Stowmarket Station. John Thurston moved to Brockford where he hired the house and shop opposite the Griffin Inn. He also rented two acres of the field behind the house, and made a nursery garden there.

His wife Emma was responsible for the shop and bakehouse. She became renowned in the locality for her rusks and sponge cakes.. The latter were beaten by hand for several minutes. The baking was done in a brick oven heated by faggots. (bundles of hedge trimmings, usually hawthorn). After the blaze had died down, food was cooked on the floor of the oven which was covered with red hot embers. Bread and pastry would be put in first. Later, when the oven was cooler, cakes etc. All were put in and removed with a peck — a flat iron plate on a long stick.


There was a charity in Wetheringsett. This was from the will of the Rev. John Sheppard, who was baptised here in 1650 and buried in the north aisle of the church in 1707. He left 50s a year from an estate in in Kelsale to be paid to the parson of Wetheringsett to buy 2d loaves weekly six poor people nominated by the parson and to be distributed by the clerk after morning service. Each Saturday some twopenny loaves were baked at Brockford and taken to the church and given to six poor widows. The late Maurice Thurston recalled taking the loaves in a handcart to the church when he was a lad - long after his great grandmother has passed on.



# CENSUS a snapshot of modern society 2021

# Census 2021 will provide

Households across Wetheringsett and Brockford will soon be asked to take part in Census 2021.

The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that gives us the most accurate estimate of all the people and households in England and Wales. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941.

It will be the first run predominantly online, with households receiving a letter with a unique access code, allowing them to complete the questionnaire on their computers, phones or tablets.

"A successful census will ensure everyone from local government to charities can put services and funding in the places where they are most needed," lain Bell, deputy national statistician at the Office for National Statistics, said,

"This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, schools and new transport routes. That's why it is so important everyone takes part and we have made it easier for people to do so online on any device, with help and paper questionnaires for those that need them."

Census day will be on March 21, but households across the country will receive letters with online codes allowing them to take part from early March.

The census will include questions about your sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And, for the first time, there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces, as well as voluntary questions for those aged 16 and over on sexual orientation and gender identity.

Results will be available within 12 months, although personal records will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations.

# Saving Suffolk's Swifts

SoSSwift in conjunction with Suffolk Wildlife Trust (SWT) would like your help in building and maintaining the declining Swift population in Suffolk.

To encourage this they are providing nesting boxes, (preferably to groups of people), as well as donating packages of nesting boxes to local groups for installation on community buildings (libraries, schools, churches etc). Historically, swifts nested in crevices in cliffs and trees, but since Roman times they have also taken advantage of the built environment, finding nest sites under the eaves and tiles of houses and church towers. In Suffolk, as elsewhere in the UK, swifts have taken to nesting communally in towns and villages. However, modern building techniques do not favour swifts., and reno-

vation and conversion of older buildings results in loss of existing nest sites. The Swift population is rapidly declining and is now an endangered species.

#### What can you do?

Ahead of the birds' May arrival, put up swift nest boxes and log their location.

Play swift calls to advertise the site as the birds arrive in May and continue to log sightings of the distinctive, entertaining 'screaming parties' of birds. Contact SOS Swifts to find out if there is a local group, or start one in your area. Local groups have had remarkable successes with installing nest boxes. If you have contacts within a public building that might be interested in supporting swifts, please put them in touch with SWT. Contact SWT for help on starting or joining a local swift group. #### Signs of hope

Dear Friends,

I am writing this in mid-January as we continue to be in the grip of Covid-19, and Matt Hancock has just said that the UK is at the worst point of the pandemic.

It has been a long and difficult time for us all, but it has brought into focus the role of our keyworkers, and the huge demand that has been placed on them. In addition to the hard work of NHS staff and Care workers, tributes have also been paid to school staff, governors and parents who have had to do home schooling, often in very difficult circumstances.

One aspect of my role that I particularly enjoy is being a Foundation Governor, and spending time in each of our 4 schools on a regular basis; but during 2020 this contact was very limited, and Year 6 left without me being able to say good-bye, while Reception started school without me being able to say hello.

I have been able to record a weekly Collective Worship for the children to access at school or at home, and I've attended some Zoom Christmas services. Governors meetings have also been via Zoom, and it has been good to stay connected in this way.

I am really looking forward to being back in school again, and I am delighted to announce the appointment of Mrs Emma Morris from Wetheringsett C of E Primary School, who will work with me as a Schools and Families Worker. Emma will help me to strengthen the links between school, church and home by developing Open the Book story-telling, special theme days linked to Harvest, Christmas, Easter and Pentecost, and to use churches as learning spaces as part of the inspired Classrooms project.

She also helps with CONNECT, a weekly family - friendly worship with crafts, activities, outdoor church and a café that happens at Thorndon Church IP13 7JR every Sunday at 4.00pm (currently online).

This appointment has been made possible by funding from Suffolk Lightwave Community, which is part of the Church of England's strategic development fund for rural communities, and Emma is a great addition to our growing Ministry Team.

Things may seem a little bleak just now, but there are signs of hope ahead. In the meantime, take care, God bless, and stay safe.

#### Wetheringsett cum Brockford Parish Council Report on the virtual meeting held Monday 4th January 2021

**Home But Not Alone Relaunched** – Following tighter coronavirus restrictions and the current lockdown Suffolk County Council has relaunched its phoneline service for anyone suffering worry or stress, unable to access shopping or prescriptions during this difficult time. For any parishioner in need please do use the freephone service 0800 876 6926 where you will be put in touch with a local volunteer or service tailored to individual needs. The phoneline is manned 9am – 5pm Monday to Friday.

**Parish Council Vacancy** – following a brief presentation on her interests in the village, Mrs. Rachel Leech was co-opted to fill the Parish Council vacancy. The Chairman welcomed Rachel to the council and thanked the other applicants for their interest. The Council is now back to a full complement of 11 councillors.

**Neighbourhood Plan** – the parish council is very pleased to report that three new members have been recruited to the working group. This will mean that the Group can now progress to the next stage of obtaining funding to progress the plan. Council members thanked the new members to the group and looked forward to working with them as the plan progresses.

**Defibrillator** – Village Hall – Cllrs Mike Pease and Dave Brown have taken over the fortnightly monitoring and checking of the defibrillator equipment which is now fully up and running. The Chairman recorded thanks to them both for taking on this task. If there are any residents also interested in helping to monitor the equipment to ensure it remains in good order please do contact Cllrs Mike Pease or Dave Brown.

**Vehicle Activated Speed Sign (VAS)** – the VAS equipment continues to be moved to different locations in the village on the regular basis. Worrying speeds of at least 115mph have been recorded in Brockford Street and 67mph in Wetherup Street. A report on the recorded speeds has been produced and this will be forwarded to Suffolk Constabulary for action.

**Parish Council Meetings** – these continue to be held virtually via video link and now with the current lockdown parish councillors will continue to meet via this method at least until Easter. It has been very helpful that some councillors are tech minded and able to ensure that meetings via this method run smoothly.



# Flooding

On 23 September 2019 and 2020 it started raining. Last year we thought we had a wet winter, but it does not compare with what we have suffered this winter, with rainfall running at twice the average. Although we have had plenty of minor flooding, the A140 in Brockford has flooded only twice since 1945, once being on the August Bank Holiday of 1963 - so it is not always in the winter that it happens. Even the centre of Wetheringsett floods infrequently; just after the War it flooded over the footbridge. That was when the stream forded the road, as you can see in the photos in the Village History. Since the stream was piped, now under the road, it has not flooded very often.

Flooding is caused by water getting to a point where it cannot get away fast enough; Church Street floods because the stream constricts as it passes through the houses in Church Close. The meadow beyond has not flooded. Flooding is also caused by water getting to the 'flood plain' quicker than it might. All we do exacerbates this. The fields are drained so the water quickly soaks through to the drains and thence the ditches. Housing areas are worse in that respect: water runs off concrete very quickly so that water that falls near Hockey Hill quickly arrives at Church Street. Attenuation is actually helped, but in a minor way, by gateway drainpipes being too small and oft blocked; it slows the flow.

If one follows the stream upwards from the Mill Cottage, there are a number of weirs before the Hall Wood. These were probably used to retain water in the summer months and possibly acts as fish ponds 150years ago. Further upstream, by the Hall Wood, there is a proper weir which may have been used to control the flow of water, possibly in summer and winter. It was suggested that it would be nice to see this functioning again. It would, but ...

As it continues to rain, remember that last May was the driest on record. AJA

H Celebration of Nature

Many of us tend to notice trees in Spring, Summer or more spectacularly, in Autumn as they put on their fiery red and gold display of colourful leaves. Winter, however, reveals the beautiful skeletons of trees, dark against winter skies. They edge the fields with their silhouettes, their tracery of branches and the sturdy trunks, rooted in a timeless landscape.

Humans come and go, but trees were here long before us and will be here long after. For example, The National Trust care for several trees of note, including Newton's Apple Tree which prompted Isaac Newton's law on gravity. There are 1,000 year old oaks and a yew near Runnymede which may have witnessed the events around the sealing of the Magna Carta in 1215 and King Henry VIII's wooing of Anne Boleyn in 1530s.

dark trees into white 'ghosts'. A spectacular sight recently here in Wetheringsett, was the strange ice phenomenon that decorated parts of Suffolk before Christmas. The ice formations on the trees were, apparently, 'rime' - the effect of freezing fog making contact with cold objects. As the sun warmed the air, ice clattered from the trees noisily, and the countryside was full of the sound, leaving shards in piles on the ground.

Winter may seem bleak, but if you look upon the trees, even in your own back garden, you will see how they support life all year round and soon those tight leaf buds will
