
Village Hall News – Advance warning of closure







A Celebration of Nature All Creatures, Great and Small



Insects Feared by some, loved by many, but needed by us all

We all delight in a butterfly as it flits from plant to plant. What if we do not see these beautiful crea-



tures anymore? We have lost 75% of our insects over the last 40 years and the solution to turning this around lies with us all. Looking at this decline realistically, and on a personal level, we need insects to pollinate the food we eat. Our recommended five a day fruit & veg consumption relies on it. Insects pollinate our crops, recycle dung, leaves and creatures that have died. They keep the soil healthy, & control pests, amongst many other things. Birds, fish and frogs all rely on insects for food and wildflowers for pollination. Without them, our world would slowly cease to function. This decline, in turn, leads to the same in their predators.



We all enjoy the swifts and bats in & around the church here in Wetheringsett. Perhaps, because the churchyard hosts an abundant insect life with its wild flowers and grasses they are still attracted there.



Leave grass long and you will hear crickets and grasshoppers. Do we really want silent, sterile gardens anyway?

Butterflies such as Meadow Browns and Gatekeepers (a name which developed through being seen around gateposts where clumps of flowers grow in gateways and along hedgerow) will take up resi-

dence, their caterpillars feeding on many varieties of grasses. Allow-

ing wildflowers to seed will bring pollinators such as bees, hoverflies and butterflies. It is evident this year that roundabouts and verges are being encouraged to grow as a natural habitat to insects. As long as roadside visibility is not compromised, we should delight in the wild carrot flowers and grasses now flowering, and who wouldn't

want to see the Alexanders in Springtime lining the coastal verges? All hosting so much life! Not to be viewed as neglect at all, but as a haven for the invertebrates on which we humans rely. If everyone makes an effort and allows as much wild growth on the land around them as they can, we can halt the decline. This world is, after all, a host to us all.

Our Paper Banks throughout the district are being gradually removed from re-cycling sites.

This is because contractors no longer found it viable to continue the service.

Waste Management Services at Mid-Suffolk & Babergh are exploring if possible alternative schemes could provide a cost effective solution, and will keep parishes updated on developments.

In the meantime, residents can continue to recycle cardboard and paper widely across Suffolk at local recycling centres and through kerbside recycling collections – where additional dry, flattened, cardboard can also be left beside the recycling bin.



All Change!

2020 was a year like no other. For everyone, young and old alike, the world we knew was turned on its head. I had lived in the town of Bedford for 32 years; I had lived in the same house for 26 years and worked for the same employer for 15 years.

I knew change was coming as I was preparing to train for ministry, but I wasn't prepared for what happened when the pandemic hit.

Like many others across the country my employers took advantage of the Furlough Scheme, and like many others the furlough was then turned to redundancy. It's a challenging time, - it challenges financially, but also emotionally. With restrictions there are not opportunities to say farewell to friends and colleagues. I remember I kept saying everything felt 'odd', couldn't quite put my finger on what I was feeling, it was just odd. In the midst of this uncertainly I held on to my daily rhythm of prayer. When everything else was shifting, like the tides of the sea, I found my anchor and harbour in Jesus. When I felt that the waves were so large, they would overcome, he would be there. In my stormy sea of uncertainty, I was reminded of when Jesus was in a boat with his friends. Jesus slept as they sailed the boat. When the storm became too much for his sailing friends and they called to him, Jesus calmly rose and quieten the storm. Every time I panicked, and like his friends in the story turned to Jesus, he calmed and quieten the storm of panic within me.

I saw an opportunity to work for the diocese of Suffolk. There were many obstacles, but the quiet voice of God kept speaking. Just wait, wait for the wind and tides to change. And then it happened, the tides and winds shifted, everything started to fall into place and before I knew it, I was planning my move to South Hartismere.

My son and I moved to Gislingham on July 7th, and on July 14th a service was held at St Mary's Church, Gislingham, where I was licenced by the Bishop Mike Harrison, Suffragan Bishop of Dunwich.

When I was thinking about how to explain my role I thought once more of the story of Jesus. Jesus was always out and about. He met people in all kinds of places: homes, market squares, the streets, and lanes, in fields, and in the temple courts. My role is to meet people in the community, to get to know you, to listen to your stories. My role is to pray for you, and as I walk the lanes and roads I pray as I go along. My role includes working with the school, and I will be supporting Rev. Julia with church services.

I have met several people already. Everyone has warmly welcomed both my son and me. Thank you. All Change! Yes, new neighbours, home, job, and community. Please say hello as I go about the village, and the other villages in the benefice.

I am very much looking forward to working here and getting to know you all.

Major new exhibits at the museum this summer include the Fowler Shredded Wheat shunter. This pretty little engine may be diesel powered, but it has a copper capped exhaust chimney which gives a very steam like effect. In April this year the Middy won the Heritage Railway Association's prestigious Morgan Restoration Award for returning 'Shreddie' to running condition.



Wetheringsett cum Brockford Parish Council Report on the meeting held Monday 2nd August

<u>Change of Venue for Parish Council Meetings</u> – please note due to the closure of the Village Hall for maintenance work over the next few months parish council meetings from September – November 2021 will be held in the Stable Block at Wetheringsett Manor School. Meetings will be open to the public as usual but space will be limited. Please let the Clerk know if you wish to attend.

Thanks are recorded to the Manor School for use of their building.

<u>**Planning**</u> – a number of planning applications were considered for recommendation to MSDC Planning, these included the Town Lane haulage site (extension of the haulage yard and stacking containers) and land east of Hockey Hill (application for 14 dwellings). The parish council recommended refusal of both applications, full comments can be found on the MSDC planning website.

Play Area – there have again been reports of broken glass and beer bottles in the children's play area at the rear of the village hall. These have been cleared away by concerned parents and/or child carers. As maintainers of the play area the Parish Council would remind parishioners this is a play area for children and parents/carers only and not for social gatherings or dogs. It is important the play area is kept safe and welcoming for children.

<u>Cemetery Grass</u> – a complaint had been received regarding the condition of the grass in the cemetery, that it was overgrown particularly around the memorial stones. As in previous years the parish council has offered to carry out four grass cuts and a one or two strims per grass cutting season. These are spread over the months of April – October and weather dependent. The parish council hopes to preserve the balance of a rural cemetery as well as being welcoming for parishioners and visitors.

<u>Village Hall</u> – as part of the refurbishment work of the Hall the parish council has pledged a sum of £15,000 for replacement of the windows and installation of patio doors, other refurbishment work will include roof replacement and replacement of the south wall. When complete the work will make a huge difference to the facilities and ambience of the Hall for the benefit of parishioners, both schools, community and other groups. As always the parish council recorded its huge thanks to the village hall committee for the work they do and to all donors and volunteers involved.

Date of next meeting: Monday 6 September 2021, 7pm at the Stable Block, Wetheringsett Manor School, Church Street.

Snippets from the Village History: Foundation of the School cont. ... School Building

In the Records Office there are accounts and receipts showing that ^(prior to the 1901 Act of Parliament) * there was a rate of 2d in the pound for house occupiers and 4d in the pound for house owners levied on the village. (To pay for the new school buildings) * An approach was made to Mr Thomas Cracknell—who declined to pay ... letter herewith:

Wickham Skeith, Stonham, February 26th 1874

Dear Sir,

In reply to your letter of the 23rd. I beg to say however willing we should have been to subscribe to your school fund, we are unable to do so as the income from our small farm in Brockford is appropriated solely to the expenses of our church. We also think you can hardly class Trustees of a Charity with the Landowners of your parish. I am, Dear Sir

Mr J Henniker wrote from his Carlton Club in 1874 and he appeared to be in agreement to some request for school requirements but it has been impossible to have any more relevant correspondence.

Carlton Club March 11th 1874 Sir,

I will with pleasure take my part in the arrangement you mention in your letter of March 3rd for additions required to the schools at Wetheringsett, provided of course, all the other Landowners consent to the proposal.
