and Nigel, who stepped in to cover holidays. There are no more deliveries until the end of January, so thank you all, and enjoy the festive break.





A sinking feeling

He said to himself in the mirror "I'm tackling the stream today". The river Linnet was its proper name. It flowed through the abbey grounds of St Edmundsbury. The area beyond his fence was called the Crankles; you can still see the ditches which formed the fish farm although they are just indentations nowadays. It looks timeless but look closer, however, and you realise that it is neglected.

The river almost dried out in summer. In autumn the water was very slow moving. It was choked by duckweed, water mint and, in some places Himalayan balsam. Nettles and hemlock grew along the margins. The former stung everything within reach and the latter towered over people like triffids. Managing it seemed very much a David and Goliath situation.

So, this David (or Davey to give him his real name) decided to get on with it. Clear The Linnet. Or at least this little stretch of the Linnet. His first effort was thwarted by his wellies. They were shortie wellies and when he stepped into the water they had filled!

Next day Davey bought some longer, knee high, wellies. He bought a rake as well. Partly for use in gathering the weed and partly as a stabiliser. He went down the steep little slope by the bridge. Only a light nettling to add a little frisson. Into the water he went. Watching out for the brambles as well as any underwater hazards, he began clearing duckweed and water mint.

The aroma of mint was lovely and the dappled sunlight through the shrubs and brambles made him smile. He was making progress. It felt underfoot like some of the watercourse might have been paved with bricks. There were old bricks in a herringbone pattern in places. Perhaps the monks had built watercourses for the fish farm. Anyway, he moved a little towards the left bank.

He edged over a bit. Suddenly it was very soft underfoot. So soft, in fact, that within moments he was sinking. There was nothing to grab except the most vicious looking bramble. Before he could even grasp the bramble, he had sunk into the slime. The smell was awful but the sensation of being sucked down was more frightening. In seconds he was waist deep in water and slime. His boots felt like weighted hands pulling him down. Trying to lift his feet was impossible. His racing mind struggled with the horror of what was happening. This was just a little ditch - how could this be happening? "Help!" he shouted, "help, please!!".

Help came; the sinking stopped. He was enveloped in a cocoon of slime. It felt like a death hug. Slowly he was hauled out. He just lay on the ground exhausted. When he came around and looked to thank those who had helped him, there was no one there. He thought he had seen someone wearing a brown overall; had they gone to summon help? Eventually, managing to get home, he hosed himself off. He had been very frightened and now he was so exhausted he went to bed.

He woke in the night. He was sweating and gasping for air and crying all at the same time. In his dream it had felt like hands pulling him down. He was choking and there was laughter. It was a nasty sadistic laughter; there were voices telling him that he belonged to them now and he would be in agony forever.

He lay awake, shaking. The bedsheets were soaking with sweat. Eventually he dropped



off to sleep. The dream came again. The voices were laughing at him and telling him that he could never escape. He was terrified. He felt himself drifting away.

He was found the next day on the river bank. Perhaps he walked in his sleep; we'll never know. He seemed smaller. He was shrivelled. His skin had a dark, slimy sheen. The coroner noted, as well, that there were bruises around his ankles. Could he have been grasped by very strong hands? It couldn't be explained. And from time to time, at night, people nearby could hear desperate cries for help as well as a strange laughter. That couldn't be explained either but those that heard it were haunted by it in their dreams.

Mid Suffolk and Babergh councils have published a report on their website on tree canopy coverage, from the consultancy Treeconomics. The report analyses tree cover down to ward level across the two Council areas. It makes interesting reading, particularly that the average in Mid Suffolk is 8.5% (Babergh is 10.4%). This compares to a national average of 16%. In our own ward, the figure is 7.2%.

As well as identifying the many benefits of trees to ourselves and to wildlife, the report also attaches monetary values to at least some of the benefits. So, for example, for Mid Suffolk, the report quantifies added value from carbon storage of £186,000,000 and a further annual £33,182,000 from carbon sequestration, pollution removal and avoided runoff - 'ecosystem services'.

Although the report at some points seems to be coming from an urban perspective, it does recognise that in rural areas trees are often confined to 'hedgerows, highways and small corners of woodland'. Therefore, tree cover in rural areas can be lower than in urban or suburban locations, however counterintuitive that may seem. Nevertheless, it recommends a target increase to 15% tree canopy cover, with a longer-term ambition of 20%, for both Mid Suffolk and Babergh.

The Council states that it is currently working on a tree planting strategy - so it's not yet known whether the recommendations of the report will be adopted as they stand, and if so whether the approach would be to concentrate any new planting in particular locations, or to try and achieve the target through more widespread planting across the wards - or a mixture of both.

But it does beg the question of how achieving this target could be achieved without compromising the other demands on the land or other kinds of habitat. The Village History records a tree planting strategy around the millennium and maybe something similar will be needed now.

I'll look out for the Council's plan and will be happy to provide further updates on the strategies that are proposed, and I would be very interested to hear others' thoughts and views.



The Regal Redevelopment

he redevelopment project has involved experts from up and down the country. They have helped to provide the experience and expertise required to create a high quality facility within the approved budget.

However three of the key roles on the team have been performed by businesses closer to home. The Project Managers have been Northmores of Cambridge who, amongst other projects, have overseen the master planning for the expansion of the Addenbrookes Hospital. The Architects have been Purcell based in Colchester who have overseen the restoration works at the Houses of Parliament and the main contractor has been local building company, Mixbrow based in Needham Market. The redevelopment has managed to retain the character of the original 1936 building whilst adding the modern facilities that are expected by today's audiences. With extensions to both sides the Regal now has three auditoria, a new front of house space, plush new seating, a new café and bar area, better staging and changing facilities and enhanced sound and audio equipment.

The opportunity has also been taken to improve the surrounding area including resurfacing the Ipswich Street Public Car Park immediately next to the Regal.

Manager David Marsh says: "The fact that the venue is so much easier to get to than other entertainment venues has proven to be very appealing. The transport links into the town are really good and rarely congested and there are nearly 200 parking spaces within 200 yards of our main entrance."

Wetheringsett cum Brockford Parish Council Report on the meeting held Monday 7 November 2022

Joe's Lane – disappointment was expressed at the removal 8 Black Poplars from the roadside verge on Joe's Lane. This appeared to be unauthorised removal as notification had not been received by the Parish Council from MSDC and there was no evidence the trees were diseased. District Cllr Andrew Stringer was present at the meeting and offered to look into why and who removed the trees and added permission should have been obtained either from MSDC or, due to the amount of timber involved, a licence from the Forestry Commission. Cllr Stringer would keep the Parish Council informed.

<u>Village Hall</u> – the Chair reported on progress made by the Management Committee: following the refurbishment work and a much improved hall and also due to increased electricity charges, the hire rates for the hall have been reviewed and will increase to £12.00 per hour with effect from 1 January 2023. A number of village events are in the pipeline and will be advertised including a regular book event/warm space for parishioners.

<u>ANPR</u> – the Parish Council had agreed to take part in this scheme (automatic number plate recognition) and has been notified a camera will be in the village during December.

Damaged Magpie Sign, Little Stonham – the Chair had reported at the last meeting the sign, which was Grade II Listed, had been damaged during the summer by a passing lorry resulting in it having to be removed. Stonham parishioners are keen to reinstate the sign it being one of a handful of villages in the country with such a landmark sign. But reinstatement could run into some thousands of pounds and to help with the cost Stonham Parish Council has set up a Just Giving fund. As a neighbouring village and as a gesture of goodwill Wetheringsett Parish Councillors were asked to consider donating to the fund. Councillors were of the view this was an historic landmark sign and believed it should be reinstated if finances permitted. A donation of £100 towards the fund was agreed.

<u>Neighbourhood Plan</u> – the working group are in the process of preparing the final draft of the Plan and this will be presented to the Parish Council at the December meeting for consideration before final submission to MSDC.

Wetheringsett Village Sign – it was reported the repair work was nearing the final stages – the sign was now in the process of being repainted.

Date of next meetings: Monday 5 December 2022, Monday 9 January 2023, Monday 6 February 2023. Meetings are held at 7pm in the Village Hall, Wetheringsett. **Parishioners are very welcome to attend.**

The Cedars Pool





citizens advice Mid Suffolk

Last year I fell for a scam when I was doing my Christmas shopping. The scam was clever. I thought I was getting a good deal but didn't realise I was being scammed until it was too late. How can I avoid the same thing happening again this year?

Scammers' tactics become more sophisticated every

year, making scams tricky to recognise, but there are things you can look out for.

If it seems too good to be true, it probably is. For example, tickets to an event that are much cheaper than they're being sold elsewhere, or a holiday that's a lot less than you'd expect to pay.

Be wary of people contacting you out of the blue on social media sites or via text and email offering an item for sale or deal on something.

Do your research. If you're buying from a website you haven't used before, spend a few minutes researching it. A good place to start is finding a website's terms and conditions. You should also look up the company's address, this can normally be found in the website's 'contact us' section and should have a street name, not just a PO box. If it's a registered UK company you can check its details on the Companies House website at gov.uk/get-information-about-a-company

Check to see what people have said about the company. It's worth looking at different review websites to see other people's feedback – don't rely on reviews the company has put on its own website.

Scammers will often ask you to pay in an unusual way, or very quickly. For example, you're asked to send money through a transfer service like MoneyGram or Western Union or pay via vouchers.

Remember never give away your personal information like a password or PIN and never click on or download anything you don't trust.

If you've transferred money, speak to your bank and the police. You should also contact the police if the scammer is in your area or you feel unsafe.

Don't feel embarrassed about reporting a scam – scammers are clever and it can happen to anyone.

Reporting a scam helps track down and stop scammers, helping to prevent it from happening to others too.
