

Memorial Unveiling and Dedication

On 10th November 1943 four local men - and a horse - lost their lives, along with thirteen American Airmen when an American bomber crashed in Brome attempting an emergency landing. Amongst them, Ernest Barker of Wetheringsett. Ernest was one of a family of thirteen children living in Wetheringsett in the late 1800s, early 1900s.

A Memorial service, attended by relatives of the airmen and representatives of the American military, will be held at The Oaksmere on 10th November - on the 80th anniversary of the fateful crash.

It is a public ceremony and all are welcome to attend.

Memorial Unveiling and Dedication



The Oaksmere Hotel, Brome, Suffolk 10th November 2023





Pictured above are the remains of B-17F 42-5793, showing the intensity of the fire causing the loss of all onboard that tragic day - November 10th, 1943. Also evident is the workmen's tumbril (cart) under the lefthand elevator. The sudden impact and subsequent fire also claiming the lives of the four workmen and their horse who were working on drainage ditches beside the new Eye airfield. This was the destination the crew were so desperately hoping to make an emergency landing at.

Their cancelled mission that morning was to lead the "Bloody Hundredth" in the role as a Pathfinder (fitted with the new H2S radar). Shortly after taking off, a fire had rapidly developed in the cockpit. Fighting to control the aircraft and the fire, they headed for the closest place to land.

Desperately close to safety, they clipped an avenue of trees, leading to the Oaksmere (then the local vicarage). Causing the plane to dramatically slam onto the roadway and bounce onto the open field and crash into the road workers and their horse. Then the fire on the plane spread to the specialist target marking ordinance, engulfing the plane and preventing escape or the safe recovery of the thirteen man crew.

Even though this story had been investigated and written about, there was so much more to this crew and the crash than was realised or could be found at that time. Through combined local and worldwide research the connections and coincidences have been coming in thick and fast. Many relatives have travelled to the scene of the crash over the decades and now they have joined forces with a dedicated local and transatlantic team to honour the memories of those brave young airmen, the local workmen and their horse.

Continuing efforts are raising awareness and funds for a memorial, which will be unveiled on the 80th anniversary of the crash on November 10th. The home base of the crew, RAF Alconbury, is attending as are representatives from RAF Mildenhall, complemented by local services and organisations connected to all the casualties. This is a public event and all are welcome to attend.

I have always had a fenced-off area in my front garden. It's about 3m x 3m, with concrete posts and metals rails around it. I recently -- and for the second time -- tried to find out something more concrete (so to speak), but neither Council, Anglian Water, nor Environment Agency could help me. I then came upon a Geographical survey of the area and there was a red marker on the map where my house would have been. Clicking on it revealed it to be a "public well", and with a date of 1936. I can imagine a hand-operated pump servicing the local residents back then.

If anyone has any knowledge of it (historical or legal), or any pictures of it as it was, then I would be very interested.

Wetheringsett cum Brockford Parish Council Report of meeting held 4 September 2023

<u>Parish Council Vacancies</u> — following advertisement of the two remaining vacancies, council members were pleased to co-opt and welcome Mrs June Weir to the council. This leaves one remaining vacancy. Members are keen that this is filled and would be particularly interested to hear from a parishioner or parishioners in the Pages Green, Pitman's Corner and Blacksmith's Green areas as these areas are currently underrepresented. Meetings are held monthly on the first Monday evening of the month at Wetheringsett Village Hall. Please do contact a councillor or the clerk if you think you would be interested, we would be very pleased to hear from you.

<u>Mid Suffolk Light Railway: tourist sign</u> – members supported the changed wording to the current tourist sign on the A140 at the Brockford Green junction from MSLR Museum to Mid Suffolk Light Railway with the train logo remaining.

<u>Community Speed Watch Scheme</u> – members welcomed the setting up of the speed watch scheme with seven parishioners having volunteered to train in the use the equipment. Following the recent concerns raised over speeding through the village this is really welcome news and members thanked the volunteers for coming forward. The group will work closely with Suffolk Constabulary.

<u>30mph speed limit at Brockford Street</u> – following the record of incidents recorded at the southern and northern ends of the Brockford Street speed limit a request will be made to Suffolk CC Highways for the speed limit to be extended further towards the Mendlesham turning south and towards the Thorndon turning at the northern end, based on the current accident data. County Cllr Stringer has offered to progress this with Highways on behalf of the Parish Council. It is hoped with the evidence available it will be agreed but members will need to await the outcome of a County Highways decision.

<u>Road Haulage Depot, Town Lane</u> – notification of appeal against the Mid Suffolk District Council enforcement notice relating to the stored shipping containers had been received from the Planning Appeal Inspectorate. Members supported the District Council's action and a response to that effect would be made to the Appeal Inspector.

<u>Village Hall Broadband</u> — Cllr Harvey reported broadband connection should be available in the village hall towards the end of September. This will enable arrangements for the proposed Internet Café to progress. Further details to be announced.

I need a new car for work but I can't afford to buy a new one so I've been looking at secondhand options. I've heard so many horror stories about people buying cars that turn out to be faulty. I'm worried that I won't know what to check, especially as I know very little about cars. How can I make sure I don't buy a dud car?

For many people, buying a car is a major purchase and whether it's new or second-hand, the process can seem daunting and complicated.

First of all, where are you going to buy the car? If you're buying from a trader, choose a trustworthy one with an established name with a good reputation. Ideally, they will be part of a trade association or follow the industry's code of practice.

If you're buying via an auction, this is much riskier as you'll have fewer legal protections like the right to returns or refunds so carefully read the terms and conditions before you bid.

If you buy from a private seller, there's a few extra steps to take. For instance, try to inspect the car at their home address so if something goes wrong later, you have a record of that.

Make sure the car's details are correct by using the DVLA's free online vehicle information checker. You'll need the registration number, MOT test number, mileage and make/model of the car to do this check. Also, check the car's MOT history for free on gov.uk/get-vehicle-information-from-dvla.

Keep a copy of both these results (take a screenshot or download the information) as well as the original advert or description of the car. You might also consider getting a private history check to see if the car's been reported stolen, still has money owing on it, or has been in a serious crash. This will cost about £20.

Inspecting the car is crucial before buying. Ideally, do this during the day when it's not raining (scratches are harder to see on a wet car) and take it for a test drive for at least 15 minutes and on different types of road, if possible. Check you have the appropriate insurance for a test drive (either your own or the seller's policy might cover you).

Don't be afraid to haggle on the price, and only pay what you can afford. Make sure you get the original (not a photocopy) of the log book and valid MOT test certificate. Never buy a car without the log book.

Often, despite doing all these checks, you might find something wrong with the car after you've bought it. You may have a legal right to a repair, the cost of a repair or some money back but it's on a case-by-case basis.

If something has gone wrong with your car and you need help, you can call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 0808 2231133.





South Hartismere Benefice

October Newsletter 2023

As I sit in my tent in Derbyshire in August, listening to the pitter patter of the rain on the canvas, I wonder whether this heralds the end of summer and the start of autumn, although this summer has not been completely rain-free like some of our recent summers.

To me, however, the beginnings of the end of summer starts when I sit and watch the combine harvester doing 'its thing' in the field opposite to my home, and I allow my attention, and gaze, to be temporarily disrupted as I look out of my study window. It is a welcome distraction from the computer screen and my GDPR and Data Protection training module detailing how unscrupulous people are trying to 'harvest' our personal data for ill-gotten gains.

I am no farmer; I am a city boy brought up in the suburbs of Norwich and the closest I came to agriculture was in history class where we studied books such as Jethro Tull's Horse Hoeing Husbandry (sic "A controversial but revolutionary method for seed planting and corn cultivation" or it was at the time). I do not speak therefore with any authority when I say that harvest is the culmination of perhaps a year long period of activity where the farmer has prepared and fertilised the ground, planted the seed, nurtured and fed the crop, and then gathered in the Harvest. Over the centuries farmers have understood more and with that have increased their yields. What is clear however, is that we ought to show our appreciation for the Harvest, and in our Church calendar, this is the time of the year in which we do it, when we say thank you to God (and to the farmers), and no matter how much we dislike the rain, it is needed for the whole cycle to be complete.

Harvest has parallels with many peoples' Christian journey. In the same way as that a harvest does not, and simply cannot, just happen without the sowing and reaping by the farmer, the same is true of my Christian beliefs. I learned these from a book, the bible, which I suspect at the time was possibly as controversial and revolutionary as they come. If the bible is a guide, I also need to be spiritually fed and nurtured by those who bring the stories (parables) in the bible to life and help us apply them to our own lives. We accept the "rainy days" as being a Christian does not mean it is all about blue skies and sunshine. As the centuries have gone by, Christians too have interpretated the teachings of Christ and given new meaning and brought hope to those that perhaps thought they were beyond the love and forgiveness of God.

I absolutely understand it when people say that they do not need to go to church to be a Christian, a church is just a building after all, but Jesus once said "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, I am there among them" and that is why we gather together and grow together. As we enter a period of vacancy, Rev Julia has encouraged us to meet together and support each other, and I invite you to join us. However, wherever you are and whatever you chose, I believe that our Heavenly father knows everything about us, all our thoughts, words and deeds and He loves us. I guess in a way He harvests our data, but in a way that offers us rewards in heaven far greater than we can possibly imagine.



British Summer Time to

Greenwich Mean Time

The period when the clocks are 1 hour ahead is called British Summer Time (BST). When the clocks go back, the UK is then on Greenwich Mean Time (GMT).



The idea of aligning waking hours to daylight hours to conserve candles was first proposed in 1784. Though the idea received some serious consideration in 1907 in the UK when British resident William Willett presented it as a way to save energy, it was never implemented.

British Summer Time was first introduced in **1916** as an Act of Parliament and over the last century the clocks have continued to move forward each year in March, with only a few exceptions, such as during the Second World War

Halloween, or Hallowe'en

...is the night before **All Hallows Day** (the original name for **All Saints Day**, on November 1st) and is called **All Hallows Even** or

All Hallows' Eve. This was shortened to **'Hallow-e'en'** by the 16th century. However, the pagan Celts believed it was a time when the walls between our world and the next became thin and porous, allowing spirits to pass through and this is probably the basis for our present-day celebrations with ghosts and witches.
